

Limitations of Current Data and Information Systems

As you review the information contained in the Sourcebook, it is important to keep in mind that data have been drawn from a number of state level criminal justice data collection systems in an attempt to provide a snapshot of crime trends in the Commonwealth. A detailed description of the existing systems can be found in Appendix A. Until these systems are fully integrated into a statewide Unified Criminal Justice Information System, there will remain limitations in the data available for analysis. These and other limitations are delineated below.

- Data collection systems of criminal justice agencies were established independently for in-house data management purposes and not for planning or policy evaluation.
- There are currently no standardized formats for defining data elements or counting criminal justice events. Agencies vary according to what is being counted (e.g., charges, cases, or individuals).
- While efforts are ongoing to unify the codes used to define each offense presented in the Sourcebook, differences still exist among agencies. For example, the Administrative Office of the Courts may define robbery offenses using a different set of offense codes than the Department of Corrections. Therefore, readers are cautioned not to compare data directly across agencies. This report is expected to improve over time as reporting practices become more consistent. A list of the offense codes used to derive each table or figure is available upon request.
- Starting in 2005, in an attempt to further unify the data, all data were requested to be reported on a calendar year basis, with the exception of fiscal data. This particular change in the reporting parameters may affect the user's ability to compare data across previous editions of the Sourcebook.
- Each year, adaptations are made to the Sourcebook in an effort to improve the quality of the information provided. The methods of reporting and the process of compiling this annual report are constantly evolving with the end goal to put forth the most accurate data available. As such, the user's ability to compare data published in the 2008 edition of the Sourcebook with previously published editions will be affected.
- Several agencies have provided updated data for years prior to 2008. As a result, the data in the 2008 Sourcebook may be different from that which is found in earlier editions of the Sourcebook. Where possible, the updated data has been included in order to provide the most accurate data available. Data updates may occur because of changes in the information systems, changes to the criminal code, and/or retroactive data updates. If such a change has occurred, where possible, the data has been recalculated for all years presented in the table or figure.
- As a result of the variation across agencies, it is currently not possible to publish a fully integrated criminal justice system report or to perform systemic trend analyses. This report is intended to provide individual snapshots of the key components of the justice system (law enforcement, courts, corrections, prosecution, and defense), and to draw general conclusions regarding system trends where possible.
- The U.S. Department of Justice estimates that approximately 46% of all violent victimizations and 37% of all property crimes are reported to the police. In order to provide a better picture of the actual levels of victimization that are occurring within the Commonwealth, the Justice and Public Safety Cabinet conducted a crime victimization study in conjunction with the Statistical Analysis Center in the spring of 2008. This study helps to provide a better picture of the actual levels of victimization that are occurring within the Commonwealth. Selected findings from the victimization study are



reported in Section II. The victimization study in its entirety is available on the Kentucky Statistical Analysis Center's website:

- Kentucky currently uses the FBI's Summary Uniform Crime Reporting Program (UCR) to collect data. The UCR is a nationwide, cooperative statistical effort of more than 17,800 city, county, college and university, state, tribal and federal agencies voluntarily reporting data on crimes. These agencies represent 94.9% of the nation's population. The UCR includes information on Part I offenses which include the violent crimes of murder and non-negligent manslaughter, forcible rape, robbery, aggravated assault and the property crimes of burglary, larceny-theft, auto theft, and arson. In response to the need for improved statistics, the UCR program has been redesigned into the National Incident-Based Reporting System (NIBRS). NIBRS captures up to 56 data elements via six types of data segments: administrative, offense, victim, property, offender, and arrestee. The Kentucky State Police (KSP) is in the final stages of the NIBRS certification process with the FBI to have the state crime repository, which is maintained by KSP, certified as a state NIBRS crime repository. Once the certification process is complete, the querying capabilities for Kentucky's crime data will be greatly enhanced. Future editions of the Sourcebook will reflect the NIBRS migration with updated charts and data elements.
- Due to severe weather-related computer problems experienced in 1996, Kentucky State Police (KSP) was unable to produce arrest information for the 1996 through 2001 *Crime in Kentucky* publications. The Administrative Office of the Courts (AOC) cooperated with the agency by providing arrest data from their court records. This should be taken into consideration when working with KSP arrest data from 1996 through 2001. Starting in 2002, the arrest data are compiled strictly from the citations and summary reports submitted to KSP, thus providing more accurate crime statistics.
- In an effort to improve the quality of the Kentucky State Police's annual *Crime in Kentucky* reports, several adaptations were made in 1998 to data reporting that have continued through 2008. These changes are in accordance with UCR guidelines and will affect the user's ability to compare data published in the 1998 through 2008 reports with previously published data.
- The following disclaimer has been issued by the Administrative Office of the Courts and applies to all data within the Sourcebook that is attributed to that agency: "Information received from COURTNET is subject to change(s), reprogramming, modification(s) of format and availability at the direction of the Administrative Office of the Courts (AOC), and may not at any particular moment reflect the true status of court cases due to ordinary limitation(s), delay(s) or error(s) in the system's operation. The AOC disclaims any warranties as to the validity of the information obtained from COURTNET. The recipient is solely responsible for verifying information received from COURTNET through the cross-referencing of official court records. The AOC shall not be liable to the recipient, or to any third party using the system or information obtained therefrom, for any damages whatsoever arising out of the use of COURTNET."
- AOC notes the following about the disposition and sentencing data in the Sourcebook: "Charge counts may include all original and amended charges within a case. The distinct count on cases allows the case to be counted once despite multiple charges or amendments to charges. Additionally, some individuals may have multiple cases, which does not allow for a case count to be inferred as a count of individuals. Dispositions in a case are based upon individual charges, since some cases may have multiple charges there can be multiple dispositions. Sentence information is much like dispositions; sentences are based upon the charge not the case. Since a case may contain multiple charges, and multiple dispositions, there may also be multiple sentences. These sentences may run consecutively to each other or they may run concurrent to each other. The sentence information provided in the Sourcebook is merely cumulative "sentenced" time, as is "probated/conditionally discharged/suspended" time."



Executive Summary

As part of its role in statewide criminal justice planning, the Kentucky Justice and Public Safety Cabinet is charged with the dissemination of information on criminal justice issues and crime trends. This report reflects the Cabinet's seventh initiative to provide state officials with comprehensive information from all components of the criminal justice system to permit improved analysis of criminal justice issues and to help guide decision-making and promote effective policy development.

In the pages that follow, readers will find a description of Kentucky's changing demographics; data from agencies providing services to victims; data on Part I offenses from the perspective of law enforcement, the courts, corrections, and the juvenile justice system; data on selected crime categories such as drug offenses, sex offenses, and school safety; and key criminal justice cost information. The summary below highlights selected data from each of the sections of the Sourcebook.

Kentucky's Changing Demographic Realities

This section presents findings from the U.S. Census Bureau's American Community Survey (ACS) three-year estimates of demographic data for the Commonwealth of Kentucky. The estimates represent the average characteristics of population and housing over the 36 months between January 2006 and December 2008 and do not represent a single point in time. Data presented includes the following:

- Kentucky's average population was 4.2 million - 2.2 million (51 percent) females and 2.1 million (49 percent) males. The median age was 37.5 years. Twenty-four percent of the population was under 18 years and 13 percent was 65 years and older.
- For people reporting one race alone, 89 percent were white, 7 percent were black or African American, 1 percent were Asian, less than 0.5 percent were American Indian and Alaska Native, less than 0.5 percent were Native Hawaiian and Other Pacific Islander, and 1 percent were some other race. One percent reported two or more races. Two percent of the people in Kentucky were Hispanic. Eighty-eight percent of the people in Kentucky were white non-Hispanic.
- Three percent of the people living in Kentucky were foreign born. Ninety-seven percent were born in the U.S., including 71 percent who were born in Kentucky. Among people at least five years old living in Kentucky, 4 percent spoke a language other than English at home. Of those speaking a language other than English at home, 51 percent spoke Spanish and 49 percent spoke some other language.
- Eighty percent of people 25 years and older had graduated from high school and 20 percent of those individuals had a bachelor's degree or higher.
- The median income of households in Kentucky was \$41,763. Seventy-five percent of the households received earnings and 19 percent received retirement income other than Social Security. Thirty-one percent of the households received Social Security. The average income from Social Security was \$13,871. These income sources are not mutually exclusive; that is, some households received income from more than one source.
- Seventeen percent of people were in poverty. Twenty-three percent of related children under 18 were below the poverty level, compared with 14 percent of people 65 years old and over. Thirteen percent of all families and 36 percent of families with a female head of household and no husband present had incomes below the poverty level.



Victim Services

- The Department of Corrections' Office of Victim Services reported that there were a total of 32,070 new V.I.N.E. registrations in 2008, up from 28,865 in 2007.
- The Crime Victims Compensation Board granted awards to 1,496 applicants in fiscal year 2008, resulting in \$1.4 million being distributed to victims of violent crime. This was down from \$2.1 million distributed to 2,107 applicants in fiscal year 2007. Awards were most commonly made for sexual assault related expenses. The least common expense for which an award was granted was attorney fees.
- In FY 2008, Kentucky's rape crisis centers provided services to 4,822 victims. That same year, the centers provided education services to 165,283 participants. The number of crisis calls decreased from 8,042 in FY 2006 to 3,896 in FY 2008.
- Domestic violence shelters in the Commonwealth served 4,273 residents and 48,367 non-residential clients in FY 2008.
- Children's advocacy centers served 4,479 child victims in FY 2008, up from 4,399 child victims in FY 2007. The centers provided 1,376 medical exams and 2,825 forensic interviews in FY 2008.
- In 2008, the Kentucky Parole Board conducted 277 victim hearings, an increase of 36% since 2005.
- In 2008, the Office of the Attorney General's Office of Victims Advocacy provided resource or referral assistance to 1,755 people and made 1,372 notifications of appeals to crime victims. The Office of the Attorney General's Department of Criminal Investigations (DCI) reported the following for 2008:
 - DCI's Drug Investigations Branch opened 152 cases and closed 125 cases.
 - DCI's Cyber Crimes Branch opened 54 cases and closed 40 cases.
 - DCI's Public Integrity/Special Investigations Branch opened 67 cases and closed 79 cases. The Branch received 341 identity theft complaints and 1,401 constituent complaints.
- Selected findings from a 2008 statewide victimization study are presented. The 2008 study used a mail survey of a sample of Kentucky residents to collect data relating to three major outcome variables of interest. These variables included: (1) fear of criminal victimization; (2) perceived risk of criminal victimization; and (3) self-reported victimization experiences for various offenses organized by property crime, violent crime, and sexual crime categories.

Reported Crime Trends

- According to the Kentucky State Police and the Federal Bureau of Investigation's Uniform Crime Reporting Program, in 2008, the Part I offense rate per 100,000 population was 2,858 in Kentucky and 3,667 in the U.S. Between 2006 and 2008, the Part I offense rate rose 2.2% in Kentucky but declined 3.7% in the U.S.
- In 2008, Virginia, West Virginia and Kentucky had the lowest Part I offense rates among the surrounding states, which also included Indiana, Illinois, Missouri, Ohio, and Tennessee. Between 2006 and 2008, however, Kentucky and West Virginia were the only two of the previously listed states that saw an increase in their Part I offense rate.



- Between 2006 and 2008, the most significant increase in the offense rate for a Part I offense was for murder, which rose 16.1% during this three-year period. During this same three year period, the offense rate for auto theft decreased 20.8%. This represented the most significant decrease for a Part I offense during this three-year period.
- Jefferson, Mason, and Boyd counties had the highest Part I offense rates in 2008 with over 45.0 reported offenses per 1,000 population. Green, Cumberland, and Hancock counties had the lowest Part I offense rates with less than 3.0 reported offenses per 1,000 population.

Arrest Trends

- The Kentucky State Police and the Federal Bureau of Investigation's Uniform Crime Reports provided data on arrests. In 2008, the arrest rate in Kentucky was higher than the national arrest rate for every Part I offense with the exception of aggravated assault and auto theft. In fact, arrest rates for murder, rape, burglary, and arson in Kentucky were more than twice the national arrest rates for those offenses. The adult arrest rate for all Part I offenses increased 17.7% between 2006 and 2008.
- In terms of raw numbers, the majority of suspects arrested in 2008 were white. However, while whites comprised almost 90% of Kentucky's population in 2008, only 76% of arrested suspects were white. Compared to the proportion of the population which they comprise, non-whites are over-represented in arrests where the race of the suspect is known. In 2008, 33% of arrestees were women. The offense with the largest percentage of women arrested (44%) was larceny-theft.

Bail Release Trends

- In 2008, the Administrative Office of the Courts' (AOC) Pretrial Services processed 261,978 cases. In 184,530 (70%) of the cases, the defendant obtained some form of pre-trial release. In 65,641 (25%) of the cases, the defendant never obtained a pretrial release and was held in jail until his or her case was disposed.
- In 2008, there were 160,438 (64%) cases in which a judge set a financial bail amount. In these cases, 102,690 (64%) defendants were able to make the bail and 57,633 (36%) defendants were not able to make bail. There were 82,463 cases in which a judge allowed a release on recognizance or set another type of non-financial bail such as a surety or unsecured bond. In these cases, 81,678 (99%) defendants were released pending trial.
- AOC's Pretrial Services conducts a thorough investigation and utilizes a risk assessment on all defendants interviewed. In 2008, there were 84,837 defendants assessed as low risk, 66,824 assessed as moderate risk and 25,049 assessed as high risk. The release rate for low risk defendants was 86%, 66% for moderate risk and 53% for high risk.

Court Disposition and Sentencing Trends

- In 2008, the Part I offense with the highest rate of conviction in Circuit Court was auto theft (61%). The lowest rate of conviction was for murder/homicide (31%) and rape (29%).



- Between 2004 and 2008, an average of 51% of Part I offense cases in Circuit Court resulted in a conviction, 21% were amended, 20% resulted in an acquittal or dismissal, and 5% were diverted. During this same five year period, an average of 39% of Part I offense cases in District Court resulted in a conviction, 31% resulted in an acquittal or dismissal, 11% were amended, and 10% resulted in an indictment by a grand jury.
- In Circuit Court, each year from 2004 to 2008, prison was the most common sentence for all Part I offense charges. In 2008, 59% of charges resulted in a sentence of prison, 25% state probation, 13% jail, and 2% other. In District Court, each year from 2004 to 2008, jail was the most common sentence for all Part I offense charges. In 2008, 90% of charges resulted in a sentence of jail, 5% local probation, and 5% other.

Trial Court Caseload Trends

- The number of criminal cases disposed in Circuit Court varies greatly by circuit. In 2008, the number of criminal cases disposed ranged from a high of 4,839 in the 30th Judicial Circuit (Jefferson County) to a low of 148 in the 18th Judicial Circuit (Harrison, Nicholas, Pendleton, Robertson). The number of criminal cases disposed in District Court varies greatly by district. In 2008, the number of criminal cases disposed ranged from a high of 128,184 in the 30th Judicial District (Jefferson County) to a low of 1,792 in the 59th Judicial District (Ballard and Carlisle Counties).
- In 2008, 98% (144,107 cases) of the Department of Public Advocacy's caseload was handled by the Trial Division. Of these cases, 74% were heard in District Court. The workload of the Department of Public Advocacy Field Offices has increased 21% from 129,159 cases in FY 2004 to 156,372 cases in FY 2008.

Appellate Court Caseload Trends

- According to the Administrative Office of the Courts, over the past five years, the total number of filings, dispositions, and opinions in the Court of Appeals has remained relatively stable. From 2004 to 2008, over 50% of the cases filed in the Court of Appeals have consistently been civil appeals.
- In 2008, 1,054 cases were filed and 1,050 cases were disposed in the Supreme Court. This was an increase from the number filed and disposed in 2007. In 2008, 64% of the Supreme Court cases disposed were discretionary and 36% were mandatory.

Commitment and Release Trends

- The Department of Corrections (DOC) reported that the total number of persons under DOC supervision declined 2.0% from 61,548 in 2007 to 60,300 in 2008. The inmate population was down 3.5% from 22,495 in 2007 to 21,706 in 2008 and the probation and parole population was down 1.2% from 39,053 in 2007 to 38,594 in 2008.
- In 2008, 68% of prison admissions were new admissions and 23% were returned parole violators. After decreasing each year between 2005 and 2007, the number of new commitments for all Part I offenses rose slightly in 2008.
- The rate of parole in 2008 was 38%.



Juvenile Justice System Trends

- The Kentucky State Police reported that between 2007 and 2008, the juvenile arrest rate declined for rape, aggravated assault, robbery and auto theft, and increased for murder, burglary, larceny-theft, and arson. Overall, the juvenile arrest rate for all Part I offenses declined 1.2%. In 2008, Kentucky's juvenile arrest rate for Part I offenses, 492.3 arrests per 100,000 juveniles, was 13.7% lower than the national juvenile arrest rate, 559.8 arrests per 100,000 juveniles.
- A total of 5,237 youth were served by the Department of Juvenile Justice in 2008, the lowest number in the past five years. More youth served by the Department of Juvenile Justice were placed in the home under the supervision of a parent or guardian between 2004 and 2008 than in any other type of placement.

Selected Crime Categories and Crime Indicators

Drug Related Offenses

- The Kentucky State Police reported that the total number of arrests for drug offenses decreased 2.5% between 2007 and 2008. During the three year period between 2006 and 2008, arrests for opium or cocaine (and their derivatives) decreased 19.4% but arrests for "Other Dangerous Non-Narcotic Drugs" increased 17.2%.
- In 2008, there were 59,093 drug arrests, or 13.8 arrests per 1,000 persons, in the Commonwealth of Kentucky. The arrest rate for drug offenses varies significantly across jurisdictions. Drug arrests ranged from a low of 1.4 arrests per 1,000 persons in Lewis County to a high of 37.0 arrests per 1,000 persons in Harlan County.
- A total of 528 cases of overdose deaths underwent autopsy by the Kentucky Office of the Medical Examiner. Of these cases, 485, or 92%, were ruled accidental. The most frequently detected drugs in the blood of overdose victims were Methadone and Oxycodone.

Methamphetamine Related Offenses

- In 2008, MethCheck blocked 35,994 attempts to violate pseudoephedrine (PSE) restrictions resulting in over 89,625 grams of PSE kept out of the hands of potential meth cooks.
- Data provided by the Kentucky State Police indicate that the greatest percentage of methamphetamine related offenses and arrests were associated with manufacturing. Kentucky State Police reported a total of 1,671 methamphetamine offenses in 2008. This was the highest number of offenses over the past three years and was primarily attributed to an increase in manufacturing offenses.
- The number of methamphetamine labs confiscated declined each year from 2004 through 2007 but increased in 2008. A total of 405 methamphetamine labs were confiscated in 2008.
- The Department of Corrections reported 348 new commitments for methamphetamine offenses in 2008.



Prescription Drug Related Offenses

- The Administrative Office of the Courts reported that in 2008, there were 1,434 prescription drug related cases in Circuit Court, 6,032 cases in District Court, and 166 cases in Juvenile Court.
- Data from the Kentucky All Schedule Prescription Electronic Reporting (KASPER) system indicate that in 2008, Clinton County had the highest rate of prescriptions dispensed for all controlled substances (4264.1 prescriptions dispensed per 1,000 population). Russell County had the lowest rate (1008.2 prescriptions dispensed per 1,000 population) for the second year in a row.
- Of the 120 counties in Kentucky, 96 counties saw an increase in the rate of prescriptions dispensed for all controlled substances between 2006 and 2008. This was a decrease from the previous three year period, 2005-2007, in which 118 counties saw an increase in the rate of prescriptions dispensed for all controlled substances.
- Between 2006 and 2008, the rate of prescriptions dispensed in Kentucky for Oxycodone increased 12.1%, Hydrocodone increased 6.9%, and Alprazolam increased 4.9%. During this same period, the rate of prescriptions dispensed in Kentucky for Methadone decreased 12.0% and Diazepam decreased 1.7%.

Driving Under the Influence (DUI) Offenses

- Data provided by the Kentucky State Police reveal that in 2008, Gallatin and Harlan Counties had the highest DUI arrest rates in the state, both with over 20.0 arrests per 1,000 population. Hickman, Robertson, Jackson, Scott, and Carlisle Counties had the lowest DUI arrest rates in the state, all with less than 3.0 arrests per 1,000 population.
- Statewide, the adult arrest rate increased 52% between 2004 and 2008 and the juvenile arrest rate fell 37% between 2004 and 2008, reaching a five year low in 2008 of 216 arrests.
- The Administrative Office of the Courts reported that in 2008, 74% of all DUI cases in Circuit Court and 68% of all DUI cases in District Court resulted in a conviction.

Sex Offenses

- Data from the Kentucky State Police indicate that the number of forcible rapes in Kentucky has risen each year since 2004. Between 2004 and 2008, the number of forcible rapes rose 16%. In 2008, the forcible rape rate in Kentucky (34.0 incidents per 100,000 population) was higher than the national forcible rape rate (29.3 incidents per 100,000 population). Of the surrounding states, only Ohio had a higher rate of forcible rape than Kentucky in 2008. Illinois, Indiana, Missouri, Tennessee, Virginia, and West Virginia had lower rates of forcible rape.
- According to the Administrative Office of the Courts, of all sex offense cases in both Circuit and District Courts, cases involving sexual abuse had the highest rate of conviction. In 2008, 82% of rape charges, 65% of sexual abuse charges, and 85% of sodomy charges in Circuit Court resulted in a sentence of prison, life, or 25 years no parole.
- The total number of new commitments to the Department of Corrections for sex offenses decreased from 499 offenders in 2007 to 469 offenders in 2008. The number of sex offenders serving out their sentence more than doubled between 2004 and 2006 but then fell to a five year low of 81 in 2008.



- In 2008, the Department of Corrections reported 5 non-consensual sex acts (inmate to inmate), 1 incident of abusive sexual contact (inmate to inmate), 4 incidents of staff sexual misconduct (staff to inmate), and 1 incident of staff sexual harassment (staff to inmate) in the state's correctional institutions.
- According to the Department of Juvenile Justice, in 2008, 47 juveniles were committed or probated for rape, 112 juveniles were committed or probated for sodomy, and 405 juveniles were committed or probated for sexual abuse.

School Safety

- For the 2007-2008 school year, the Kentucky Center for School Safety (KCSS) published its ninth annual report on school safety. The report confirmed that many of the efforts to reduce school crime have indeed been successful.
- Of Kentucky's total 2007-2008 public school population (639,719 students), 6.78% of students committed an offense that resulted in an out-of-school suspension or expulsion with or without services.
- Over the five-year period between the 2003-2004 school year and the 2007-2008 school year, the total number of disciplinary actions for Part I violations decreased 50%, and Part II violations decreased 10%.
- Compared to the 2006-2007 school year, the number of reported law violations decreased for all Part I offenses with the exception of larceny-theft in the 2007-2008 school year.
- Although drug abuse violations have accounted for the largest number of Part II law violations during the last five school years, the number of violations have declined each consecutive year since the 2003-2004 school year.
- Region 3, Jefferson County, had the highest rate of disciplinary actions for law violations with a rate of 1.77 disciplinary actions per 100 students. Region 8, Southeast, had the lowest rate with .34 disciplinary actions per 100 students.

Key Criminal Justice Cost Information

- In FY 2008, Kentucky's criminal justice agencies' enacted budgets totaled \$1,169,103,000.00
- According to the Department of Corrections, the cost of incarceration per inmate per day in Kentucky's correctional institutions varies by institution and level of security, from a low of \$35.56 at the Marion Adjustment Center, a minimum security private facility, to a high of \$72.38 at the Kentucky State Reformatory, a medium security state facility. The total institutional average is \$52.14 per inmate per day. In FY 2008, the cost of electronic monitoring was \$10.69 per inmate per day. The cost of probation and parole supervision was \$2.64 per inmate per day.
- In FY 2008, the Department of Corrections spent \$60,184,096.38 on medical expenditures up from \$54,747,066.88 spent on medical expenditures in FY 2007. Since 2004, medical expenditures have increased 45%.
- According to the Department of Juvenile Justice, in FY 2008, the total annual costs for juvenile institutions, including detention centers, youth development centers, and group homes, was \$57,741,212.00.



Section I: Kentucky's Changing Demographic Realities

In order to create effective policy, the demographic trends that affect the Commonwealth must be considered. Kentucky's changing demographic realities require us to understand and address the impact such changes have on the criminal justice system. As readers analyze the criminal justice statistics presented in the 2008 edition of the Sourcebook, it is helpful to consider them within the context of the demographic realities of the state.

For example, as Kentucky's population ages and the number of mature and aging adults outweighs the number of teens and young adults, changes in the criminal justice system are expected. If the population of inmates in jails and prisons reflects the transformation of the demographic profile of the state and nation, there may be an increase in medical expenditures in jails and prisons as a growing portion of their population will be older. Kentucky's Department of Corrections has already experienced a 45% increase in medical expenditures in the five year period between 2004 and 2008 (see Section XII, Table 12.5).

The U.S. Census Bureau's American Community Survey (ACS) produces population, demographic and housing unit estimates for communities across the nation. The ACS collects and produces population and housing information every year instead of every ten years. Collecting data every year provides more up-to-date information throughout the decade about the U.S. population at the local community level. It is a critical element in the Census Bureau's reengineered decennial census program. The ACS collects information such as age, race, income, commute time to work, home value, veteran status, and other important data. About three million housing unit addresses are selected annually, from across every county in the nation.

In 2009, the Census Bureau released its three-year estimates based on ACS data collected from 2006 through 2008. These 3-year estimates are available for geographic areas with a population of 20,000 or more. Kentucky has 55 counties with more than 20,000 people and these counties are included in the 2006-2008 ACS estimates. The estimates represent the average characteristics of population and housing over the 36 months between January 2006 and December 2008 and do not represent a single point in time.

The findings from the ACS three-year estimates of demographic data for the Commonwealth are presented below.

- Kentucky's average population was 4.2 million - 2.2 million (51 percent) females and 2.1 million (49 percent) males. The median age was 37.5 years. Twenty-four percent of the population was under 18 years and 13 percent was 65 years and older.
- For people reporting one race alone, 89 percent were white, 7 percent were black or African American, 1 percent were Asian, less than 0.5 percent were American Indian and Alaska Native, less than 0.5 percent were Native Hawaiian and Other Pacific Islander, and 1 percent were some other race. One percent reported two or more races. Two percent of the people in Kentucky were Hispanic. Eighty-eight percent of the people in Kentucky were white non-Hispanic.
- There were 1.7 million households in Kentucky. The average household size was 2.5 people.


Sourcebook of Criminal Justice Statistics in the Commonwealth

- Eighty-four percent of the people at least one year old living in Kentucky were living in the same residence one year earlier; 9 percent had moved during the past year from another residence in the same county, 4 percent from another county in the same state, 3 percent from another state, and less than 0.5 percent from abroad.
- Eighty percent of people 25 years and older had graduated from high school and 20 percent of those individuals had a bachelor's degree or higher.
- For the employed population 16 years and older, the leading industries in Kentucky were educational services, health care, and social assistance (22 percent) and manufacturing (15 percent).
- The most common occupations were: management, professional, and related occupations (31 percent); sales and office occupations (25 percent); production, transportation, and material moving occupations (17 percent); service occupations (16 percent); and construction, extraction, maintenance and repair occupations (10 percent). Seventy-eight percent of the people employed were private wage and salary workers, 15 percent were federal, state, or local government workers; and 6 percent were self-employed.
- The median income of households in Kentucky was \$41,763. Seventy-five percent of the households received earnings and 19 percent received retirement income other than Social Security. Thirty-one percent of the households received Social Security. The average income from Social Security was \$13,871. These income sources are not mutually exclusive; that is, some households received income from more than one source.
- Seventeen percent of people were in poverty. Twenty-three percent of related children under 18 were below the poverty level, compared with 14 percent of people 65 years old and over. Thirteen percent of all families and 36 percent of families with a female head of household and no husband present had incomes below the poverty level.
- Kentucky had 1.7 million occupied housing units - 1.2 million (70 percent) owner occupied and 494,000 (30 percent) renter occupied. Six percent of the households did not have telephone service and 8 percent of the households did not have access to a car, truck, or van for private use.


Figure 1.a: Projected Population by Age, 2000-2050

Section II: Victim Services

Kentucky has established many successful programs to provide services and aid to victims of crime. Providing services to victims of crime is an important element of the criminal justice system. Data selected for this section were provided by V.I.N.E., the Crime Victims Compensation Board, the Cabinet for Health and Family Services, the Kentucky Parole Board, the Office of the Attorney General, and the 2008 Kentucky Victimization Study.



V.I.N.E.

The Office of Victim Services is the arm of the Department of Corrections that provides victims with an automatic notification system to alert them about a change in the custody status of their offender. The system is known as Victim Information and Notification Everyday (V.I.N.E.).

The nation's first automated victim notification system was created in Jefferson County, Kentucky, in December 1994. Like many progressive acts, a tragedy was the impetus for the establishment of the V.I.N.E. system. In 1993, Mary Byron was murdered by her estranged boyfriend after he was released from the Jefferson County Jail. Byron was not notified of his release. Byron's parents, Pat and John Byron, led a crusade to ensure that their daughter's death would not be in vain. As a result of their efforts, software engineers developed the V.I.N.E. system and implemented it at the Jefferson County Jail. In 1996, Kentucky again led the way, becoming the first state in the nation to provide victim notification on a statewide basis. Today, more than 2,100 communities nationwide have implemented the V.I.N.E. system. More than two-thirds of the states have established statewide notification through V.I.N.E. The federal government also offers a victim notification service and funds supportive grants (e.g., the Statewide Automated Victim Information and Notification (SAVIN)). Nationally, V.I.N.E. generates approximately 700,000 notification calls each month.

The V.I.N.E. system receives booking and release data from all county jails and Department of Corrections institutions. Victims can obtain information about an offender's location, custody status, sentence expiration date, and scheduled parole hearing date. The victim can also register to be notified of changes in an offender's custody status. Information can be obtained by calling a toll free number, by calling the Office of Victim Services, via email, or via the Internet through VINELink. The service is available 24 hours a day. Whenever possible, the system provides notification of an offender's release 72 hours prior to the release. In order to ensure that victims receive notification in a timely manner, V.I.N.E. will call the registered telephone number every 30 minutes during a 24 hour time period or until the call is acknowledged by the registered person.

The following information was obtained from the Department of Corrections' Office of Victim Services:

- Of the 1,252,292 searches for offenders through the V.I.N.E. program in 2008, 4% were conducted via VINEWatch, 41% were conducted via telephone, and 55% were conducted via VINELink.
- In 2008, V.I.N.E. reported a total of 426,096 victim information and registration calls into the call center and 489,852 notification calls issued by the call center.
- There were 32,070 new V.I.N.E. registrations in 2008, up from 28,865 in 2007.

Crime Victims Compensation Board

Legislation establishing the Crime Victims Compensation Board (CVCB) was enacted in 1974. The office opened in 1978 with the purpose of compensating victims for whom violent crime has resulted in financial hardship due to physical and psychological injury or death. Applicants may receive awards of up to \$25,000 for medical services, hospital expenses, funeral expenses, counseling, loss of wages, and/or benefits for the dependents of a victim who is deceased. The board operates under Kentucky Revised Statute (KRS) 346 and Kentucky Administrative Regulations (KAR) Title 107. The role of the board is to determine eligibility and amount of reimbursement to crime victims.

The following information was received from the Crime Victims Compensation Board:

- The CVCB granted awards to 1,496 applicants in fiscal year 2008, resulting in \$1.4 million being distributed to victims of violent crime. This was down from \$2.1 million distributed to 2,107 applicants in fiscal year 2007.
- Awards were most commonly made for sexual assault related expenses. The least common expense for which an award was granted was attorney fees.

Other Victim Services

The Kentucky Cabinet for Health and Family Services (CHFS), the Kentucky Parole Board, and the Office of the Attorney General also provide services to victims. CHFS houses several programs that serve victims of crime including rape crisis centers, domestic violence shelters, and children's advocacy centers. The data provided by CHFS detail the types of services provided through these programs and the number of victims served. The Kentucky Parole Board provided the number of victim hearings held each month. The Office of the Attorney General provided numerous data that detail the work the office does to protect the Commonwealth and advocate for victims.

- In FY 2008, Kentucky's rape crisis centers provided services to 4,822 victims. That same year, the centers provided education services to 165,283 participants. The centers logged 263,074 volunteer hours in FY 2008, up from 224,919 hours in FY 2007. The number of crisis calls decreased from 8,042 in FY 2006 to 5,974 in FY 2007 to 3,896 in FY 2008.
- Domestic violence shelters in the Commonwealth served 4,273 residents and 48,367 non-residential clients in FY 2008.
- Children's advocacy centers served 4,479 child victims in FY 2008, up from 4,399 child victims in FY 2007. The centers provided 1,376 medical exams and 2,825 forensic interviews in FY 2008.
- In 2008, the Kentucky Parole Board conducted 277 victim hearings, an increase of 36% since 2005.
- In 2008, the Office of the Attorney General's Office of Victims Advocacy provided resource or referral assistance to 1,755 people and made 1,372 notifications of appeals to crime victims.
- The Office of the Attorney General's Medicaid Fraud and Abuse Control Division collected over \$25 million from settlements in 2008. The Division received a total of 2,451 complaints over the course of the year.
- The Office of the Attorney General's Department of Criminal Investigations (DCI) reported the following for 2008:
 - DCI's Drug Investigations Branch opened 152 cases and closed 125 cases.
 - DCI's Cyber Crimes Branch opened 54 cases and closed 40 cases.
 - DCI's Public Integrity/Special Investigations Branch opened 67 cases and closed 79 cases. The Branch received 341 identity theft complaints and 1,401 constituent complaints.

Kentucky Victimization Study

In 2008, Eastern Kentucky University's Dr. David May, Patricia Harden, and Lena Kline conducted a statewide victimization study on behalf of the Kentucky Statistical Analysis Center. The results of the study were published in a report, *Criminal Victimization Experiences, Fear of Crime, Perceptions of Risk, and Opinion of Criminal Justice Agents among a Sample of Kentucky Residents, 2008*. This is the third report of its kind conducted in Kentucky in the past decade. Previous studies were conducted in 1999 and 2004.

National research using a wide variety of methods (e.g., self-report surveys, official police reports, hospital records) suggests that only about one-third of all crime is reported to the police via official arrest and crime data; as such, self-report surveys asking respondents about their victimization experiences are an essential resource for legislators and criminal justice agents in developing policy and determining funding priorities.

The 2008 study used a mail survey of a sample of Kentucky residents to collect data relating to three major outcome variables of interest. These variables included: (1) fear of criminal victimization; (2) perceived risk of criminal victimization; and (3) self-reported victimization experiences for various offenses organized by property crime, violent crime, and sexual crime categories. In an effort to make the sample as representative of the state as possible, a random sample of 5,000 registered voters was drawn from a list of all registered voters in Kentucky. Of that original 5,000, completed surveys were received from 1,616 adult respondents, a response rate of 36.6% after accounting for all undeliverable addresses. The majority of the respondents were female (54.7%), white (94.2%), married (65.5%), and over the age of 36 (81%). Most also had a household income less than \$80,000 (66.5%), and had no children under 18 living at their residence (64.7%). One in three (34.4%) were college graduates or had completed some postgraduate work.

Respondents were asked a number of questions that allowed researchers to estimate the levels of fear of criminal victimization among the respondents. The responses to these questions are presented in Table 2.9. Even though respondents did not necessarily think crime was decreasing in their community, most were satisfied with the protection they were receiving from law enforcement in their community. Most respondents were not afraid of being raped or murdered and most do not let fear of criminal victimization prevent them from doing the things they like to do. This good news should be taken with some caution, however. Approximately half of the respondents were afraid of property crime (both having their money/possessions taken from them and having someone break into their house while they were away) and more than 10% of the respondents were at least somewhat afraid of each of the crimes they were asked about. As such, a substantial minority of respondents, while not necessarily changing their daily activities because of their fear of crime or their perceived risk of crime, still are concerned they may be victimized, particularly by property crimes such as theft and burglary.

An important contribution of this research effort was that it allowed for the examination of the self-reported impact that terrorism has had on the lives of the respondents. The results of the survey questions addressing terrorism are presented in Table 2.10. The results suggest that the vast majority of the respondents are both fearful and expectant that a terror attack will occur in the United States. Additionally, a majority of the respondents are also fearful and expectant that someone in Kentucky will be victimized by terrorism as well. Nevertheless, respondents are far less concerned about their own chances of victimization by terrorism or the chance that a family member or someone in their local community will be a victim in a terrorist attack.

The study also examined the incidence of property crime and violent crime among respondents. While the vast majority of respondents had not been victimized by crime in the past 12 months, those who had were far more likely to be victimized by property crime than by violent crime. If the respondent had been victimized by crime in the past 12 months, they were asked whether they reported that crime to police. Table 2.11 presents those results. Although it appears that a substantial number of robbery, assault, and property crime victims reported their victimization experience to police, victims of sexual crimes were generally unlikely to report that victimization experience to police.

Another important contribution of this research involves the examination of the relationships between victims and offenders. For all victimizations where the victim was able to know who their victimizer was, victims of robbery, threats, rape, and assault were far more likely to be victimized by someone they knew than a stranger. Only 10.4% of the victims in this study had been victimized by a stranger.

Section III: Reported Crime Trends

In reviewing data on crime trends, it is important to note the type of data being presented along with the inherent limitations of that data. For example, although law enforcement agencies collect and maintain information on both arrests and offenses reported to the police, researchers generally agree that reported offenses provide a better measure of crime since these reports usually occur closer in time to the actual incidents. While arrests also provide a measure of law enforcement activity, arrests may not be made in all cases and arrests may also reflect specialized enforcement efforts rather than an actual increase in the incidence of crime. Part I offense data, as reported by the Kentucky State Police, are provided in the following section.

- In 2008, the Part I offense rate per 100,000 population was 2,858 in Kentucky and 3,667 in the U.S.
- Between 2006 and 2008, the Part I offense rate rose 2.2% in Kentucky but declined 3.7% in the U.S.
- In 2008, Virginia, West Virginia and Kentucky had the lowest Part I offense rates among the surrounding states, which also included Indiana, Illinois, Missouri, Ohio, and Tennessee. Between 2006 and 2008, however, Kentucky and West Virginia were the only two of the previously listed states that saw an increase in their Part I offense rate.
- The violent offense rate increased between 2006 and 2007 but declined slightly (0.2%) between 2007 and 2008. The property offense rate decreased between 2006 and 2007, but increased 3.4% between 2007 and 2008.
- Between 2007 and 2008, the offense rate declined for robbery, auto theft, and arson. During this same period, the offense rate rose for murder, rape, aggravated assault, burglary, and larceny-theft.
- Between 2006 and 2008, the most significant increase in the offense rate for a Part I offense was for murder, which rose 16.1% during this three-year period.
- Between 2006 and 2008, the offense rate for auto theft decreased 20.8%. This represented the most significant decrease for a Part I offense during this three-year period.
- Jefferson, Mason, and Boyd counties had the highest Part I offense rates in 2008 with over 45.0 reported offenses per 1,000 population. Green, Cumberland, and Hancock counties had the lowest Part I offense rates with less than 3.0 reported offenses per 1,000 population.
- Of cities with a population greater than 10,000, Newport and Ashland had the highest Part I offense rates in 2008.





Section IV: Arrest Trends

This section presents information on arrest trends in the Commonwealth as reported by the Kentucky State Police and the Federal Bureau of Investigations.

- The adult arrest rate for all Part I offenses increased 17.7% between 2006 and 2008.
- In 2008, the arrest rate in Kentucky was higher than the national arrest rate for every Part I offense with the exception of aggravated assault and auto theft. In fact, arrest rates for murder, rape, burglary, and arson in Kentucky were more than twice the national arrest rate.
- In terms of raw numbers, the majority of suspects arrested in 2008 were white. However, while whites comprised almost 90% of Kentucky's population in 2008, only 76% of arrested suspects were white. Compared to the proportion of the population of which they comprise, non-whites are over-represented in arrests where the race of the suspect is known.
- In 2008, 33% of arrestees were women. The offense with the largest percentage of women arrested (44%) was larceny-theft.





Section V: Bail Release Trends

This section presents data on the types of bail release used in the Commonwealth, as provided by the Administrative Office of the Courts (AOC). The information reported in this section was obtained from the AOC's Pretrial Services' Pretrial Release Information Management (PRIM) System.

- In 2008, AOC's Pretrial Services processed 261,978 cases. In 184,530 (70%) of the cases, the defendant obtained some form of pre-trial release. In 65,641 (25%) of the cases, the defendant never obtained a pretrial release and was held in jail until his or her case was disposed.
- In 2008, there were 160,438 (64%) cases in which a judge set a financial bail amount. In these cases, 102,690 (64%) defendants were able to make the bail and 57,633 (36%) defendants were not able to make bail.
- There were 82,463 cases in which a judge allowed a release on recognizance or set another type of non-financial bail such as a surety or unsecured bond. In these cases, 81,678 (99%) defendants were released pending trial.
- AOC's Pretrial Services conducts a thorough investigation and utilizes a risk assessment on all defendants interviewed. In 2008, there were 84,837 defendants assessed as low risk, 66,824 assessed as moderate risk and 25,049 assessed as high risk. The release rate for low risk defendants was 86%, 66% for moderate risk and 53% for high risk.



Section VI: Court Disposition and Sentencing Trends

This section presents information from the Administrative Office of the Courts on case dispositions and sentencing trends for Part I offenses.

- In 2008, the Part I offense with the highest rate of conviction in Circuit Court was auto theft (61%). The lowest rates of conviction was for murder/homicide (31%) and rape (29%).
- Between 2004 and 2008, an average of 51% of Part I offense cases in Circuit Court resulted in a conviction, 21% were amended, 20% resulted in an acquittal or dismissal, and 5% were diverted.
- Between 2004 and 2008, an average of 39% of Part I offense cases in District Court resulted in a conviction, 31% resulted in an acquittal or dismissal, 11% were amended, and 10% resulted in an indictment by a grand jury.
- In Circuit Court, each year from 2004 to 2008, prison was the most common sentence for all Part I offense charges. In 2008, 59% of charges resulted in a sentence of prison, 25% state probation, 13% jail, and 2% other.
- In District Court, each year from 2004 to 2008, jail was the most common sentence for all Part I offense charges. In 2008, 90% of charges resulted in a sentence of jail, 5% local probation, and 5% other.





Section VII: Trial Court Caseload Trends

In this section, Circuit and District Court case data from the Administrative Office of the Courts and data from the Department of Public Advocacy are presented.

- Statewide, the number of criminal cases disposed in District Court remained relatively stable between 2004 and 2008, with the exception of domestic violence cases which decreased 40% between 2004 and 2008.
- The number of criminal cases disposed in Circuit Court varies greatly by circuit. In 2008, the number of criminal cases disposed ranged from a high of 4,839 in the 30th Judicial Circuit (Jefferson County) to a low of 148 in the 18th Judicial Circuit (Harrison, Nicholas, Pendleton, Robertson).
- With a 64% increase between 2004 and 2008, the 55th Judicial Circuit (Bullitt County) had the largest percent increase in the number of criminal cases disposed in Circuit Court.
- With a 43% decrease between 2004 and 2008, the 43rd Judicial Circuit (Barren and Metcalfe Counties) had the largest percent decrease in the number of criminal cases disposed in Circuit Court.
- The number of criminal cases disposed in District Court varies greatly by district. In 2008, the number of criminal cases disposed ranged from a high of 128,184 in the 30th Judicial District (Jefferson County) to a low of 1,792 in the 59th Judicial District (Ballard and Carlisle Counties).
- With a 38% increase between 2004 and 2008, the 19th Judicial District (Bracken, Fleming, and Mason Counties) had the largest percent increase in the number of criminal cases disposed in District Court.
- With a 36% decrease between 2004 and 2008, the 41st Judicial District (Clay, Jackson, and Leslie Counties) had the largest percent decrease in the number of criminal cases disposed in District Court.
- In 2008, 98% (144,107 cases) of the Department of Public Advocacy's caseload was handled by the Trial Division. Of these cases, 74% were heard in District Court.
- The workload of the Department of Public Advocacy Field Offices has increased 21% from 129,159 cases in FY 2004 to 156,372 cases in FY 2008.




Table 7.6: Department of Public Advocacy: Caseload by Division, 2008






**Figure 7.c: Department of Public Advocacy Trial Division:

Section VIII: Appellate Court Caseload Trends

This section presents information from Kentucky's Appellate and Supreme Courts.

- Between 2004 and 2008, the total number of filings, dispositions, and opinions in the Court of Appeals has remained relatively stable.
- The number of published opinions by the Court of Appeals decreased from 299, or 20% of the total opinions, in 2007 to 185, or 13% of total opinions, in 2008.
- From 2004 to 2008, over 50% of the cases filed in the Court of Appeals have consistently been civil appeals.
- A total of 1,054 cases were filed and 1,050 cases were disposed in the Supreme Court in 2008. This was an increase from the number filed and disposed in 2007.
- In 2008, 64% of the Supreme Court cases disposed were discretionary and 36% were mandatory.

Section IX: Commitment and Release Trends

This section presents information from the Department of Corrections (DOC) on prison admissions, commitments, sentences, and releases for Part I offenses, and from the Parole Board on hearings, paroles, deferrals, and serve-outs.

- In 2008, the average daily inmate population ranged from a low of 290 at the Bell County Forestry Camp to a high of 1,954 at the Kentucky State Reformatory.
- The total number of persons under DOC supervision declined 2.0% from 61,548 in 2007 to 60,300 in 2008. The inmate population was down 3.5% from 22,495 in 2007 to 21,706 in 2008 and the probation and parole population was down 1.2% from 39,053 in 2007 to 38,594 in 2008.
- In 2008, 68% of prison admissions were new admissions and 23% were returned parole violators.
- In 2008, the average sentence for Part I offenses ranged from a high of 28 years for murder to a low of 5 years for auto theft. The average sentence for all Part I offenses was 15 years with an average of 21 years for violent offenses and 9 years for property offenses.
- The average sentences for burglary and larceny-theft more than doubled between 2004 and 2008.
- After decreasing each year between 2005 and 2007, the number of new commitments for all Part I offenses rose slightly in 2008.
- New commitments for murder, aggravated assault, burglary, larceny-theft, and arson increased between 2007 and 2008 and new commitments for rape, robbery, and auto theft decreased over this same time period.
- The rate of parole in 2008 was 38%.




Table 9.8: Average Sentence by Part I Offense, 2004-2008























Section X: Juvenile Justice System Trends

This section presents information on juvenile offenders served by the juvenile justice system. Data are presented from the Kentucky State Police and the Department of Juvenile Justice.

- Between 2007 and 2008, the juvenile arrest rate declined for rape, aggravated assault, robbery and auto theft, and increased for murder, burglary, larceny-theft, and arson. Overall, the juvenile arrest rate for all Part I offenses declined 1.2%.
- In 2008, compared to national juvenile arrest rates for Part I offenses, Kentucky's juvenile arrest rates were lower for aggravated assault, robbery, larceny/theft, and auto theft but higher for murder, rape, burglary, and arson.
- In 2008, Kentucky's juvenile arrest rate for Part I offenses, 492.3 arrests per 100,000 juveniles, was 13.7% lower than the national juvenile arrest rate, 559.8 arrests per 100,000 juveniles.
- Kentucky's juvenile violent offense rate was 47.0% lower than the national violent arrest rate and its property offense rate was 8.3% lower than the national property arrest rate.
- A total of 5,237 youth were served by the Department of Juvenile Justice in 2008, the lowest number in the past five years.
- More youth served by the Department of Juvenile Justice were placed in the home under the supervision of a parent or guardian between 2004 and 2008 than in any other type of placement.

















Section XI: Selected Crime Categories and Crime Indicators

In addition to reviewing criminal justice system data pertaining to Part I offenses, data on selected categories of crime have been included for informational purposes. These categories include drug related offenses with a particular focus on methamphetamines and prescription drugs, driving under the influence (DUI) offenses, sex offenses, and school safety. Information presented in this section includes data from the Kentucky State Police, Federal Bureau of Investigation, Administrative Office of the Courts, Department of Corrections, Cabinet for Health and Family Services' Kentucky All Schedule Prescription Electronic Reporting (KASPER) system, and Kentucky Center for School Safety.



Drug Related Offenses

- The total number of arrests for drug offenses decreased 2.5% between 2007 and 2008.
- Between 2006 and 2008, arrests for opium or cocaine (and their derivatives) decreased 19.4%.
- Between 2006 and 2008, arrests for “Other Dangerous Non-Narcotic Drugs” increased 17.2%.
- The arrest rate for drug offenses varies significantly across jurisdictions. Drug arrests ranged from a low of 1.4 arrests per 1,000 persons in Lewis County to a high of 37.0 arrests per 1,000 persons in Harlan County.
- In 2008, there were 59,093 drug arrests, or 13.8 arrests per 1,000 persons, in the Commonwealth of Kentucky.
- A total of 528 cases of overdose deaths underwent autopsy by the Kentucky Office of the Medical Examiner. Of these cases, 485, or 92%, were ruled accidental. The most frequently detected drugs in the blood of overdose victims were Methadone and Oxycodone.





Methamphetamine Related Offenses

In 2007, Kentucky became the second state to implement a real-time statewide electronic monitoring system capable of blocking the sale of pseudoephedrine (PSE) products to individuals in violation of purchasing more than 9 grams in 30 days (KRS 218A.1446). The program, MethCheck, provides 24/7 access to law enforcement officers conducting investigations on individuals suspected of violations of PSE restrictions. In 2008, the system blocked 35,994 attempts to violate PSE restrictions resulting in over 89,625 grams of PSE kept out of the hands of potential meth cooks. MethCheck is a partnership between the Office of Inspector General Professional Standards Branch, the Cabinet for Health and Family Services, and the Kentucky Office of Drug Control Policy.

To illustrate the incidence of methamphetamine manufacturing, trafficking, and abuse in the Commonwealth, this section presents data from the Kentucky State Police, the Administrative Office of the Courts, and the Department of Corrections.

- The greatest percentage of methamphetamine related offenses and arrests were associated with manufacturing.
- Kentucky State Police reported a total of 1,671 methamphetamine offenses in 2008. This was the highest number of offenses over the past three years and was primarily attributed to an increase in manufacturing offenses.
- The total number of methamphetamine arrests decreased between 2006 and 2007, falling from 1,223 arrests in 2006 to 690 arrests in 2007, but then increased to 927 arrests in 2008.
- The number of methamphetamine labs confiscated declined each year from 2004 through 2007 but increased in 2008. A total of 405 methamphetamine labs were confiscated in 2008.
- In 2008, there were 2,408 cases involving methamphetamine offenses in Circuit Court, 1,943 cases in District Court, and 23 cases in Juvenile Court.
- From 2005 to 2008, the average sentence for methamphetamine related offenses has been 9 years.
- The Department of Corrections reported 348 new commitments for methamphetamine offenses in 2008.




Figure 11c: Number of Methamphetamine Related Offenses and Arrests, 2006-2008






Figure 11.f: Total Methamphetamine Related Cases, 2004-2008



Prescription Drug Related Offenses

Misuse, abuse and illegal sale of prescription drugs is a significant threat to patient safety in the Commonwealth of Kentucky. Illegal prescription drug activity has reached epidemic proportions, with more and more incidents of “doctor shopping” being uncovered and the street values of “legal” drugs reaching all-time highs.

The Kentucky All Schedule Prescription Electronic Reporting (KASPER) system is Kentucky’s Prescription Monitoring Program (PMP). PMPs vary in their characteristics, but they all have a common goal of reducing prescription drug abuse and diversion. KASPER is one of the most comprehensive PMPs in the country. The system catalogs most of the schedule II-V controlled substance prescriptions written and dispensed within the state, and provides a tool for practitioners, pharmacists and law enforcement to improve patient safety and fight the abuse and diversion of controlled substance prescription drugs. In February 2006, President Bush released a national drug control strategy that hails KASPER as one of the nation’s flagship PMPs.

Responsibility for KASPER resides in the Cabinet for Health and Family Services, Office of the Inspector General, with maintenance and enhancements to the system provided by the Cabinet’s Office of Information Technology. Kentucky statutes require dispensers of controlled substances to report the prescriptions dispensed once within every eight days. These data are received by a data collection agent who then has an additional eight days to edit and process the data and provide the data to the Cabinet, where the data is loaded into the KASPER system. The data are then available to authorized users of the system, who may be prescribers for medical treatment of a patient, dispensers for pharmaceutical treatment of a patient, law enforcement officers for an active drug related investigation, licensing boards for a licensee, the Kentucky Medicaid program for a recipient, a grand jury (by subpoena), and a judge or probation or parole office administering a drug diversion or probation program.

A KASPER report shows all controlled substance prescriptions a patient has had for a specified time period, as well as the doctor who prescribed them and the dispenser who dispensed them. Kentucky Revised Statute 218A.240 provides that the Cabinet shall use the data for investigations, research, statistical analysis and educational purposes, and shall proactively identify trends in controlled substance usage and other potential problem areas.

This section includes data on prescription drug activity in the Commonwealth as collected by the Kentucky State Police, Administrative Office of the Courts, Department of Corrections, Department of Juvenile Justice, and KASPER.

- Prescription drug related offenses and arrests increased between 2007 and 2008. The greatest percentage of prescription drug related offenses and arrests were related to possession.
- In 2008, there were 1,434 prescription drug related cases in Circuit Court, 6,032 cases in District Court, and 166 cases in Juvenile Court.
- There were 68 new commitments to the Department of Corrections for prescription drug related offenses in 2008. The average sentence for prescription drug related offenses was 5 years in 2006, 2007, and 2008.
- The Department of Juvenile Justice reported that 15 youth were committed and 47 youth were probated in 2008 for prescription drug related offenses.
- In 2008, Clinton County had the highest rate of prescriptions dispensed for all controlled substances (4264.1 prescriptions dispensed per 1,000 population). Russell County had the lowest rate (1008.2 prescriptions dispensed per 1,000 population) for the second year in a row.



- Of the 120 counties in Kentucky, 96 counties saw an increase in the rate of prescriptions dispensed for all controlled substances between 2006 and 2008. This was a decrease from the previous three year period, 2005-2007, in which 118 counties saw an increase in the rate of prescriptions dispensed for all controlled substances.
- Between 2006 and 2008, the rate of prescriptions dispensed in Kentucky for Oxycodone increased 12.1%, for Hydrocodone increased 6.9%, and for Alprazolam increased 4.9%.
- Between 2006 and 2008, the rate of prescriptions dispensed in Kentucky for Methadone decreased 12.0% and for Diazepam decreased 1.7%.






Figure 11.j: Total Prescription Drug Related Cases, 2004-2008



Figure 11.m: Prescription Drug Related Offenses: Juveniles Committed or Probated to the Department of Juvenile Justice, 2004-2008





Driving Under the Influence (DUI) Offenses

- In 2008, Gallatin and Harlan Counties had the highest DUI arrest rates in the state, both with over 20.0 arrests per 1,000 population. Hickman, Robertson, Jackson, Scott, and Carlisle Counties had the lowest DUI arrest rates in the state, all with less than 3.0 arrests per 1,000 population.
- Statewide, the adult arrest rate increased 52% between 2004 and 2008 and the juvenile arrest rate fell 37% between 2004 and 2008, reaching a five year low in 2008 of 216 arrests.
- Over the five year period between 2004 and 2008, an average of 89% of DUI arrestees were white, 8% were black, and 2% were other/unknown.
- Over the five year period between 2004 and 2008, an average of 81% of DUI arrestees were male and 19% were female.
- In 2008, 74% of all DUI cases in Circuit Court and 68% of all DUI cases in District Court resulted in a conviction.


















Sex Offenses

- The number of forcible rapes in Kentucky has risen each year since 2004. Between 2004 and 2008, the number of forcible rapes rose 16%.
- In 2008, the forcible rape rate in Kentucky (34.0 incidents per 100,000 population) was higher than the national forcible rape rate (29.3 incidents per 100,000 population).
- Of the surrounding states, only Ohio had a higher rate of forcible rape than Kentucky in 2008. Illinois, Indiana, Missouri, Tennessee, Virginia, and West Virginia had lower rates of forcible rape.
- Kentucky and Illinois were the only states in this group that increased their rate of forcible rape between 2006 and 2008. Kentucky saw the largest increase with a 10.6% increase between 2006 and 2008.
- In 2008, there were 640 rape cases, 740 sexual abuse cases, and 455 sodomy cases disposed in Circuit Court.
- In 2008, there were 412 rape cases, 632 sexual abuse cases, and 213 sodomy cases disposed in District Court.
- Of all sex offense cases in both Circuit and District Courts, cases involving sexual abuse had the highest rate of conviction.
- In 2008, 82% of rape charges, 65% of sexual abuse charges, and 85% of sodomy charges in Circuit Court resulted in a sentence of prison, life, or 25 years no parole.
- In 2008, the average sentence was 13 years for rape offenses, 14 years for sodomy offenses, and 9 years for sexual abuse offenses.
- The total number of new commitments to the Department of Corrections for sex offenses decreased from 499 offenders in 2007 to 469 offenders in 2008.
- The number of sex offenders serving out their sentence more than doubled between 2004 and 2006 but then fell to a five year low of 81 in 2008.
- In 2008, the Department of Corrections reported 5 non-consensual sex acts (inmate to inmate), 1 incident of abusive sexual contact (inmate to inmate), 4 incidents of staff sexual misconduct (staff to inmate), and 1 incident of staff sexual harassment (staff to inmate).
- According to the Department of Juvenile Justice, in 2008, 47 juveniles were committed or probated for rape, 112 juveniles were committed or probated for sodomy, and 405 juveniles were committed or probated for sexual abuse.












School Safety

When House Bill 330 was passed in the 1998 General Assembly, an opportunity emerged for Kentucky to employ research driven strategies to maintain a safe and secure learning environment for all children. The Kentucky Center for School Safety (KCSS) was established to provide data analysis, research, and technical assistance, and to disseminate information on successful strategies to ensure school safety. KCSS is a collaborative partnership between a contract agency, Eastern Kentucky University, and three partner agencies, the University of Kentucky, Murray State University, and the Kentucky School Boards Association. For the 2007-2008 school year, KCSS published its ninth annual report on school safety. The report confirmed that many of the efforts to reduce school crime had indeed been successful. The following is a summary of the findings as they pertain to law violations and consequences in Kentucky schools:

- Of Kentucky's total 2007-2008 public school population (639,719 students), 6.78% of students committed an offense that resulted in an out-of-school suspension or expulsion with or without services.
- Over the five-year period between the 2003-2004 school year and the 2007-2008 school year, the total number of disciplinary actions for Part I violations decreased 50% and for Part II violations decreased 10%.
- Compared to the 2006-2007 school year, in the 2007-2008 school year, the number of reported law violations decreased for all Part I offenses with the exception of larceny-theft.
- There were no reported homicide or rape offenses over the five year period beginning with the 2003-2004 school year through the 2007-2008 school year.
- Although drug abuse violations have accounted for the largest number of Part II law violations during the last five school years, the number of violations have declined each consecutive year since the 2003-2004 school year.
- Region 3, Jefferson County, had the highest rate of disciplinary actions for law violations with a rate of 1.77 disciplinary actions per 100 students. Region 8, Southeast, had the lowest rate with .34 disciplinary actions per 100 students.




Figure 11.ab: Total Disciplinary Actions for Part I Violations, School Years 2003-2004 – 2007-2008

Section XII: Key Criminal Justice Cost Information

While monitoring changes in crime trends, it is also important to track the range of costs associated with incarceration, community supervision, and criminal justice programs for adults and juveniles. This section includes data from the Department of Corrections, Department of Juvenile Justice, and the Justice and Public Safety Cabinet's Grants Management Branch.

- In FY 2008, Kentucky's criminal justice agencies' enacted budgets totaled \$1,169,103,000.00
- The cost of incarceration per inmate per day in Kentucky's correctional institutions varies by institution and level of security, from a low of \$35.56 at the Marion Adjustment Center, a minimum security private facility, to a high of \$72.38 at the Kentucky State Reformatory, a medium security state facility. The total institutional average is \$52.14 per inmate per day.
- In FY 2008, the cost of electronic monitoring was \$10.69 per inmate per day. The cost of probation and parole supervision was \$2.64 per inmate per day.
- According to the Department of Juvenile Justice, in FY 2008, the total annual costs for juvenile institutions, including detention centers, youth development centers, and group homes, was \$57,741,212.00.
- In FY 2008, the Department of Corrections spent \$60,184,096.38 on medical expenditures up from \$54,747,066.88 spent on medical expenditures in FY 2007. Since 2004, medical expenditures have increased 45%.



Grants Management

KRS 15A.150 authorizes the Grants Management Branch, Justice and Public Safety Cabinet, to receive and award federal funds obtained from the U.S. Department of Justice. Federal funds are awarded to state agencies, local units of government, and private, nonprofit organizations based on three broad types of grants: Formula, Block, and Discretionary. Formula grants are based on specific criteria determined by the granting agency (e.g., the Edward Byrne Memorial Grant Program awards money based on a state's population and criminal justice expenditures). Block grants are federal allocations provided to states for a specific purpose, with relatively broad guidelines for allocation. Discretionary grants are those used for special purposes (e.g., funding of the Statistical Analysis Center). Among the major grant programs administered by the Grants Management Branch are the following:

- **Edward Byrne Memorial State and Local Law Enforcement Assistance Block Grants (LLEBG)**
The Byrne program is a federal formula grant program which awards monies to states based on a formula consisting of a base amount of .25 percent of the total allocation plus Kentucky's relative share based on population. Funds are available from 28 program areas and are used to create safer communities and improved criminal justice systems. State and local criminal justice system agencies are eligible to apply. The Byrne and LLEBG grant programs were replaced by Justice Assistance Grants in 2005; limited residual Byrne grant funds remain for award.
- **Edward Byrne Memorial Justice Assistance Grants (JAG)**
Funds are awarded to the Commonwealth and certain qualifying local jurisdictions based on population and the number of Uniform Crime Report (UCR) Part I violent crimes reported to the Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI). These federal funds may be used to provide funding to state agencies and local units of government, and private not-for-profit organizations, for the implementation of law enforcement programs; prosecution and court programs; prevention and education programs; corrections and community corrections programs; drug treatment programs; victims services; and planning, evaluation, and technology improvement programs. The JAG program replaced Byrne and LLEBG grants in 2005.
- **Law Enforcement Service Fee Fund (LSF)**
This program is fully funded by the Commonwealth of Kentucky, with revenue derived from a fee assessed on persons convicted of driving under the influence. Funds are used for DUI related purposes (e.g., blood alcohol testing and equipment, DUI education).
- **Victims of Crime Act (VOCA)**
VOCA is a federal formula grant program allocated according to population. Funds are provided to units of local government and non-profits to provide direct services to crime victims. Funds are typically used to support victim advocate positions. Any private, nonprofit agency providing direct services to victims of crime is eligible.
- **Violence Against Women Act (VAWA)**
VAWA is a federal formula grant program allocated according to population. Funds are generally provided for victim advocacy/services (30%), prosecution (25%), law enforcement (25%), discretionary (15%), and courts (5%). Eligible agencies/entities include victim service programs, law enforcement, prosecutors, and any program providing services to adult victims of domestic violence and sexual assault.

The remainder of this section presents information on grant awards by county, and includes data on the Alternatives to Incarceration grant program administered by the Kentucky Corrections Commission. For brief program descriptions of additional grants administered by the Grants Management Branch, see Appendix C.



Appendix A: Description of Existing Criminal Justice Information Systems

CourtNet

Allows easy and expeditious access to criminal and civil cases filed with the Kentucky Court System. Provides court case tracking, consolidates local court information systems (including KY Courts), and serves as the system for accessing statistical data.

eWarrants

Web-based application that provides law enforcement real-time access to arrest warrant information. The system provides a mechanism to create paperless complaints that flow to the judge for review and signature into a warrant then to law enforcement for servicing. Project is currently in pilot with a planned state roll-out for late FY 2011.

JusticeXchange

Web portal that provides law enforcement and other criminal justice officials instant access to information about offenders held in jails throughout the state and across the country. Based on data collected automatically from local jail management systems, JusticeXchange provides near real-time current and historical information about incarcerated offenders, including biographical information, charges, photographs, and behavioral reports, all accessible through a secure website. Vendor: Appriss.

Juvenile Offender Records Information (JORI)

Case management system that tracks juvenile offenders through the criminal justice system. Includes offenders' demographic information, charges, work history, education, and treatment. JORI is a Visual Studio .NET application.

Kentucky Offender Management System (KOMS)

Kentucky Offender Management System is a Web-Enabled Integrated Offender Management tool which has replaced outdated individual software applications that were used for managing, processing and tracking Kentucky DOC inmates and Probation & Parole clients. The objectives of KOMS are as follows:

- Maintain a repository of information that applies to all offenders regardless of their current status, such as demographics and criminal history.
- Maintain a repository of information unique to offenders who are under supervision because they are serving probation, parole, etc. Examples of this type of information are supervision fees owed and paid, supervision contacts, and risk/needs assessments.
- Maintain a repository of information unique to offenders who are incarcerated, such as housing, classification, custody level and job assignments.
- Calculate and maintain sentence calculations for all KY offenders regardless of their status.
- Maintain a repository of information about facilities, staff, outside organizations, and persons within those organizations that deal with offenders, regardless of their status.
- Store this repository of information in a relational database that is shared across all this functionality.
- Provide access to this database through a web browser, such as Microsoft Internet Explorer®, using a tree-type menu that expands and contracts.



- Make the update of this data simple, intuitive, reliable, and secure.
- Provide many non-updateable views of this data for everyday use by anyone who is authorized to access this system via a secure sign on.
- Produce operational and management reports and statistics needed by the users.

Kentucky State Police

Core systems described utilize various vendor proprietary technology, in addition to SQL, ORACLE, VB, and FILENET.

- **Automated Fingerprint Identification System (AFIS)**
Statewide system of Livescan devices in each county detention center, state prison facilities, juvenile detention centers and commercial drivers license-HazMat testing sites, tied into centralized AFIS system. Provides for the capture, storage, and search of fingerprint information, and transmission to FBI-IAFIS system. Vendor: Motorola.
- **Computer Aided Dispatch (CAD)**
Utilized by 17 KSP Posts/HQ Dispatch Centers to provide call tracking, emergency medical dispatch, call response, etc., in addition to providing required GIS mapping of land line and mobile callers. Vendor: Interact.
- **Computerized Criminal History System (CCH)**
State criminal history repository for fingerprint supported arrests and supporting participation in Triple I. Includes utilization of XML rapsheet. Vendor: SAIC.
- **Kentucky's Open Portal Solution (KYOPS)**
Serves as the statewide law enforcement system for the electronic/hard copy capture, quality control, transmission, storage and retrieval of the following law enforcement report types: traffic collision, crime, uniform citation, courtesy warning, call response, and field information reports which are fed directly to the state's Intelligence Fusion Center. Features of the electronic reporting component include real time submission of reports, GPS coordinates collection, both integrated crime scene and collision investigation diagramming software and all modules support the utilization of 2D bar code scanners for importing drivers license data. The system also features a statewide Master Name Index and Master Location Index, utilizing all mentioned data sources. Access to submitted records is provided through a secure web portal, with various "canned" reports available for statistical analysis of crime and collision data, as well as the ability to do custom inquiries across the various data sources for crime/collision analysis, planning and resource allocation. Historical Crime mapping and Collision mapping are also accessible through the web portal. Vendor: IDMS.
- **KyWINS Messenger**
Open source Instant Messaging solution customized for usage by public safety personnel operating on wireless mobile data system. Provides uniform data/IM interoperability to public safety personnel, across boundaries, agencies and disciplines, free of charge. Also allows communication back to PC based personnel in traditional wired settings. Currently being piloted with 100+ users in 4-5 different counties, from police officers to fire/EMS personnel to the state Office of Homeland Security. Expected roll out statewide in 2007. Vendor: Jabber-Jive Software.
- **Law Enforcement Information Network of Kentucky (LINK)**
Serves as the primary law enforcement communications network providing access to NCIC and NLETS. Also houses all state "hot" files, to include EPO/DVO, wanted, missing persons, sex offenders, etc. Vendor: CPI.
- **Mobile Data Computer System (MDCS)**
Statewide system which encompasses over 125 tower sites and base stations all networked to three integrated Internet Protocol Network Controllers, providing seamless Mobile Data access to all law enforcement agencies in the state, with no ongoing monthly charge for airtime usage. This access allows agencies to access both state level (LINK) and federal (NCI) data from their cars, in addition to providing silent dispatch, AVL other features, and instant messaging, depending upon the software utilized by the agency.



Agencies utilizing the state standard mobile client software, BIO-key, may utilize the state provided shared mobile message switch, thereby eliminating the need to purchase their own, and giving them access to all agencies/users, utilizing the same platform. Vendor: InterAct.

- **Sex Offender Registry (SOR)**

Serves as the state repository of registered sex offender information, including public access website, listing all registered offenders. Linked to the National Public Sex Offender registry system. Vendor: CPI.

KY Courts

County specific stand-alone electronic case management system that tracks all information related to court cases.

Victim Information and Network Everyday (VINE)

The automated notification system that alerts victims about a change in the custody status of their offender. Internet browser front end, SQL server database. Vendor: Appriss.



Appendix B: Part I and Part II Offenses

Part I Offenses

Murder: Murder/homicide is the willful (nonnegligent) killing of one human being by another or the killing of another person through gross negligence. Deaths caused by negligence, attempts to kill, assaults to kill, suicides, and accidental deaths and deaths of persons due to their own negligence, accidental deaths not resulting from gross negligence, and traffic fatalities are excluded.

Rape: Rape is defined as the carnal knowledge of a person, forcible or otherwise, against the person's will. Rapes by force and attempts to rape, regardless of the age of the victim, are included. Excluded are rapes where the victim is under the age of consent and no force is used.

Robbery: Robbery is the taking or attempting to take anything of value from the care, custody, or control of a person or persons by force or threat of force or violence and/or by putting the victim in fear.

Aggravated Assault: Assault is the unlawful attack by one person upon another for the purpose of inflicting severe or aggravated bodily injury. This type of assault usually is accompanied by the use of a weapon or by means likely to produce death or great bodily harm. All assault attempts where serious injury would have been likely to occur are included. Assaults which do not include the use of a dangerous weapon and in which there was no serious or aggravated injury are excluded. These simple assaults are counted as Part II crimes.

Burglary: Burglary is unlawful entering or remaining in a building with the intent to commit a crime. This includes entries where force of any kind is used to gain entrance, entries where no force was used (an unlocked door or by concealment), and attempts to enter forcibly (even though entry was not actually gained).

Larceny-theft: Larceny-theft is the unlawful taking, carrying, leading, or riding away of property from the possession or constructive possession of another. Examples are thefts of bicycles, motor vehicle parts and accessories, shoplifting, pocket-picking, or the stealing of any property or article that is not taken by force and violence or by fraud. Attempted larcenies are included. Embezzlement, confidence games, forgery, check fraud, etc., are excluded.

Auto Theft: Auto theft includes all thefts and attempted thefts of motor vehicles. Motorboats, construction equipment, airplanes, and farming equipment are specifically excluded from this category.

Arson: Arson includes any willful or malicious burning or attempt to burn, with or without intent to defraud, a residence, public building, motor vehicle or aircraft, personal property of another, etc. Only fires determined to have been willfully or maliciously set are classified as arson.



Part II Offenses

Part II Offenses consist of all other offenses, with the exception of traffic violations. They generally include the following:

- Other Assaults
- Arson
- Forgery and Counterfeiting
- Fraud
- Embezzlement
- Stolen Property: Buying, Receiving, Possession
- Vandalism
- Weapons: Carrying, Possession
- Prostitution and Commercialized Vice
- Sex Offenses
- Narcotic Drug Laws
- Gambling
- Offenses Against Family
- Driving Under the Influence
- Liquor Laws
- Drunkenness
- Disorderly Conduct
- All Other Offenses (except traffic)
- Curfew and Loitering Laws
- Runaways



Appendix C: Additional Grant Program Descriptions

Bulletproof Vest Partnership Grant Program

This federal program assists states and local units of government in equipping their law enforcement officers with armored vests. A match of 50% is required, and the Chief Executive Officer of each jurisdiction must coordinate the vest needs among all its law enforcement agencies.

National Criminal History Improvement Program

State agencies designated by the Governor (in this case, the Kentucky Justice and Public Safety Cabinet), can apply for funding to enhance criminal history records. Allowable uses include costs associated with database automation, interfacing with the National Incident-Based Reporting System (NIBRS), equipment, training, and research. A 20% match is required.

Residential Substance Abuse Treatment Program

This program is designed to assist states and local governments in developing and implementing residential substance abuse treatment programs in correctional facilities. A 25% match is required. The program also requires urinalysis or other drug testing of participating prisoners, separation from the general correctional population, and is required to last between six and twelve months.

State Justice Statistics Program for Statistical Analysis Centers (SACs)

State agencies authorized with responsibility for the state's Statistical Analysis Center can apply. In Kentucky, the SAC is a component of the Justice and Public Safety Cabinet. No match is required. Funds can be used for the establishment and operation of a SAC.

Paul Coverdell Forensic Science Improvement Grant Program

Coverdell funds are available to state and local governments to improve the quality and timeliness of forensic science and medical examiner services and/or to eliminate backlogs in the analysis of forensic evidence, including controlled substances firearms examination, forensic pathology, latent prints, questioned documents, toxicology, and trace evidence.
