## **INTRODUCTION**

Supporting a successful transition to the community and maintaining stability within the offender population is central to the mission of the Kentucky Department of Corrections. The Department protects public safety by ensuring that offenders receive programming to support their successful return to the community. Programs are standardized across the Department, implemented with dedicated resources, and regularly reviewed for quality assurance.

This practical guide was prepared to highlight the Department's programs. Each program summary in this directory contains key information: a Program Description, Time Frame, Admission Criteria, Program Content, Applicable Policies, and Locations.

The Department maintains a catalogue of evidence-based, life skills, promising practice, and substance abuse programs to address a wide range of reentry, supervision, and incarceration needs. Program offerings vary based on available resources and the needs of the offender population. The Department of Corrections maintains a list of the programs that are currently available.

## **General Information**

#### Definitions

<u>Evidence Based</u> Programs are programs demonstrated by scientific research to reliably produce reductions in recidivism.

<u>Promising Practice</u> represents a program that may have some research or data showing positive outcomes but does not meet criteria as an Evidence Based program. Promising practices have a clear focus and includes processes of accountability and evaluation.

<u>Life Skills</u> Programs provide strategies to assist in removing barriers for successful reintegration and address skill areas including time management, money management, use of technology, communication, and social skills.

<u>Substance Abuse</u> Programs are an evidence based drug treatment program for individuals with a substance use disorder.

<u>Case Management</u> An unstructured collaborative process of meeting with a member of the behavior management team/contract staff in a small group or individual setting, to discuss needs, progress in programming, conduct assessment of needs, safety planning, relapse prevention planning, and care coordination. Does not include attendance tracking or progress review.

<u>Religious Program</u> means a program that does not have a secular purpose or a program, which has a curriculum that advances or inhibits specific religion(s) and does not qualify for program credit.

# **Cognitive Behavioral Programs**

Program Name	Challenges
Program Description	This <b>Evidence Based</b> program assists offenders with mental illness. It is intended to help them lead a more pro-social lifestyle by thinking more realistically and exhibiting healthier behaviors. Topics that are addressed include stress management, medication management, family history, relationship skills, socialization, coping with emotions, recreation, thinking errors, and substance abuse.
Time Frame	Depending on offender needs, this program lasts approximately six months. Groups are held daily and individual attention is offered weekly.
Program Credit	These programs receive <b>90</b> days program credit upon completion.
Admission Criteria	All program recommendations are based on their specific criminogenic needs identified in the KyRAS assessment. This program targets offender that are clinically diagnosed with mental health issues.

Program Name	CHALLENGES-SHARE
Program Description	This <b>Evidence Based</b> program assists offenders with mental illness and co-occurring mental illness and substance use disorder (SUD). The program is divided into two (2) treatment tracks – one for offenders diagnosed with serious mental illness (SMI) or other mental illness (MI) and one for offenders diagnosed with co-occurring (COD) MI and SUD. Services are targeted to include stress management, relapse prevention, family history, relationships skills, socialization, coping with emotions, and thinking errors, integrating the twelve-step model with the peer-driven therapeutic community model, supplemented with licensed mental health professionals to provide direct services and support.
Time Frame	Depending on offender needs and progress, offenders can expect to participate for a minimum of 6 months.
Program Credit	This program receive <b>90</b> days program credit upon completion.
Admission Criteria	All program recommendations are based on their specific criminogenic needs identified in the KyRAS assessment. Offenders may be referred to CHALLENGES-SHARE if they have a diagnosis of a serious mental illness or other mental illness (SMI/MI track) or a diagnosis of a co-occurring MI and SUD (COD track).

Name	Challenges-Share Mentor
	This <b>Evidence Based</b> on-going mental health and co-occurring disorders treatment opportunity for those assessment with mental health or co-occurring disorder, have completed the Challenges-Share Program, and have been classified to be housed in a prison setting. Residents in these programs are housed separately from the general population, thereby forming their own leadership within a community. This encourages pro-social behavior, responsibility, and accountability through peer support and uninterrupted focus on mental health and co- occurring disorders treatment.
Program Description	<ul> <li>Therapeutic Community Model which includes, but is not limited to:</li> <li>Model prosocial behaviors and attitudes;</li> <li>Model success or failure through trial and error learning process;</li> <li>Model support and guidance to peers and staff in the community;</li> <li>Model new behaviors, attitudes, and responsible living on a daily basis;</li> <li>Model appropriate accountability to bring awareness to criminal &amp; addictive thinking patterns and behaviors for self and peers;</li> <li>Model leadership through tasks designed to create clear and understandable expectations;</li> <li>Model appropriate interpersonal boundaries, conflict resolution, and stress coping skills;</li> <li>Hazelden "Living with Co-occurring and Mental Health Disorders" ©</li> <li>New Harbinger "The Addiction Recovery Skills Workbook" ©</li> </ul>
Time Frame	Time frame for completion is an average of <b>6 months</b> for Challenges-Share Mentor Program. May continue as Challenges-Share Mentor as an assigned job.
Program Credit	This program receives <b>90</b> days program credit upon completion. Additional credit is not awarded if transitioned into the assigned job of Challenges-Share Mentor.
Admission Criteria	<ol> <li>Must have successfully completed the Challenges-Share Program or predecessor program;</li> <li>Must submit an application and have completed an interview with staff and receive staff recommendation;</li> <li>Applicants selected demonstrate strong leadership skills, effective communication skills, honesty, and integrity;</li> <li>Applicants with any disciplinary violations will be reviewed and considered by staff on a case-by-case basis.</li> <li>While enrolled in Challenges-Share Mentor program, an inmate/offender may enroll in one (1) other evidence-based program. In addition, anyone eligible to attend GED may do so and this will not count as the one additional program.</li> <li>Minimum of 6 months to parole eligibility</li> </ol>

Program Description	This Cognitive-Behavioral program is designed to assist offenders in job readiness. This program includes completion of 8 modules with a minimum of 8-10 group sessions utilizing the 'Job Readiness'© workbook, resume preparation and completion, various supplemental materials, and the completion of homework assignments prepared outside of group. *MRT and Employment Program certifications are required to facilitate this program.
Time Frame	Depending on offender needs and progression, offenders can expect to participate in a minimum of 9-12 group sessions.
Program Credit	This program receives <b>45</b> days program credit upon completion.
Admission Criteria	All program recommendations are based on their specific criminogenic needs identified in the KYRAS assessment. Offenders should be within 24 months prior to release.

Program Description	This <b>Evidence Based</b> program utilizes interactive journaling materials from the Change Companies and is designed to serve a very specialized population: offenders who have a substance abuse history and require training and treatment of pre-contemplation in order to trigger the drive and motivation to enroll and complete the Substance Abuse Program.
Time Frame	Depending on offender needs, this program lasts approximately six months.
Program Credit	This program receives <b>90</b> days program credit upon completion.
Admission Criteria	All program recommendations are based on their specific criminogenic needs identified in the KyRAS assessment.

Program Name	Go Further
Program Description	This <b>Evidence Based</b> program is a specialized CoreCivic program offered at Lee Adjustment Center. Offenders enrolled in this program participate in a 4-part process to release from incarceration. Parts include On Ramp, Highway, Off Ramp, and Destination. This program walks an offender from the beginning of his incarceration to the end and reentry to the community. This is an evidence based, interactive journaling program.
Time Frame	Depending on offender needs, this program lasts approximately six months.
Program Credit	This program receives <b>90</b> days program credit upon completion.

Program Name	MRT <sup>©</sup> Moral Reconation Therapy MRT <sup>©</sup> is the product of Correctional Counseling Inc. (CCI). MRT <sup>©</sup> and its related products are property of CCI. CCI is the sole source provider of MRT <sup>©</sup> products.
Program Description	This <b>Evidence Based</b> program combines group presentations and individual assignments, along with facilitator guidance when necessary. The program was designed in a criminal justice setting for offenders involved in the criminal justice system. MRT <sup>©</sup> targets an offender's belief system and attempts to raise their level of moral reasoning in their decision-making process. The MRT <sup>©</sup> program has been researched for over thirty years and has proven reduction in recidivism levels at multiple points of progress within the program, as well as after overall program completion. MRT <sup>©</sup> is designed to achieve formal program completion after 12 ingroup steps. The workbook for this program is entitled 'How to Escape Your Prison' <sup>©</sup> and includes the use of a separate facilitator guide.

Program Description	This Cognitive-Behavioral program is designed to assist with relapse prevention by helping offenders to recognize risky situations, cravings, and triggers. This program requires completion of eight (8) modules over a minimum of 8-10 group sessions. Groups are open-ended and require the completion of the 'Staying Quit' <sup>®</sup> workbook, as well as preparation of homework assignments outside of group. *MRT certification is required to facilitate this program.
Time Frame	Depending on offender needs and progression, the offender should expect to participate for a minimum of 8-10 sessions.
Program Credit	This program receives <b>60</b> days program credit upon completion.
Admission Criteria	<ul><li>Prerequisite: Must have successfully completed a Substance Use Disorder Treatment program as approved by DOC on the current conviction and sentence.</li><li>All program recommendations are based on their specific criminogenic needs identified in the KYRAS assessment and having a substance use history.</li></ul>

Program Description	This Cognitive-Behavioral program focuses on providing treatment to offenders involved in addictive/co-dependent relationships – confronting the issues of manipulation and dependence. Targets domestic violence, unhealthy relationships, enabling, substance abusers and criminality. Offenders will be required to participate in a minimum of 12 group sessions, along with preparation of homework assignments outside of group. This program utilizes the 'Untangling Relationships' <sup>©</sup> workbook. *MRT certification is required to facilitate this program.
Time Frame	Depending on offender needs and progression, this program includes completion of 12 modules with a minimum of 12 group sessions utilizing the 'Untangling Relationships'© workbook.
Program Credit	This program receives <b>90</b> days program credit upon completion.
Admission Criteria	All program recommendations are based on their specific criminogenic needs identified in the KYRAS assessment.

Program Description	The MRT <sup>®</sup> Mentoring program strives to ensure a higher success rate for those who have previously completed MRT <sup>®</sup> . A Mentor within the MRT <sup>®</sup> program will be held to a higher behavioral expectation than those participating in the MRT <sup>®</sup> group. Mentorship is beneficial for both the offender serving as the mentor, as well as for the offenders participating in the MRT <sup>®</sup> program. As a mentor, participants will complete steps 13-16 from their original 'How to Escape your Prison' <sup>®</sup> workbook, along with completing of the 'Your Lifework' <sup>®</sup> Workbook. Participants must also complete a total of twelve (12) dedicated 'helping sessions' where the mentor's focus is exclusively assisting regular MRT group participants with no focus on their own step work. A maximum of 3 mentors per MRT group of 15 (ratio of 1:5) shall assist in monitoring and assisting the current involved group with step completion while working through their own specific program curriculum.
Time Frame	Length of time in program is dependent on individual offender progress, although offenders can generally expect to participate in 24-36 open-ended group sessions. Offenders will also be required to work individually on homework assignments as part of the program requirements.
Program Credit	This program receives <b>90</b> days program credit upon completion.
Admission Criteria	<b>Prerequisites:</b> completion of MRT <sup>©</sup> in the last 30 months. No convictions of major disciplinary violations or Violation of Supervision Reports for the preceding 6 months. Must still possess original 'How to Escape your Prison' workbook from MRT program completion. Must successfully demonstrate retention of MRT principles via essay questions submitted to program facilitator for review. All program recommendations are based on their specific criminogenic needs identified in the KYRAS assessment.

A recovery program for Trauma-Informed care, Breaking the Chains of Trauma is based on the MRT approach. It is designed to target trauma-related symptoms by incorporating the key issues outlined by SAMHSA's Trauma-Informed Treatment Protocol.
Description	The workbook for this program is entitled 'Breaking the Chains of Trauma'© and includes the use of a separate facilitator guide. The workbooks are designated by gender, as this program requires separate groups for women & men.
	*Training certification specific to the MRT Trauma (Breaking the Chains of Trauma) program is required to facilitate this program.
Time Frame	Length of time in program is dependent on individual offender progress, although offenders can generally expect to participate in 9 -12 open-ended group sessions. Offenders will also be required to work individually on homework assignments as part of the program requirements.
Program Credit	This program receives <b>60</b> days program credit upon completion.

Program Name	RHU - Short Term Behavioral Modification
Program Description	This program is designed to help offenders identify thinking patterns that will assist them in the assessment of emotional and cognitive reasoning. Offenders will engage in cognitive behavioral restructuring using a structured manual that encompasses the following subjects: active listening, successful change, responsible behavior, taking responsibility, cognitive behavioral chains, and identification of high-risk situations.
Time Frame	Offenders complete within 8 weeks (meeting within the Restrictive Housing Unit for 4 weeks and in General Population/Transition for 4 weeks)
Program Credit	Offenders will complete the program when: 1) offender transitions to general population, 2) completes curriculum under program standards, 3) abstains from disciplinary infraction 3.11, cat 4 or higher for 90 days post transition to general population. Offender will receive 30 days program credit upon completion.
